AN URGENT NEED TO REFORM EXISTING WAYS OF ASSESSING RESEARCH

Assessment processes relying predominantly on journal- and publication-based metrics can be a hurdle to the recognition of diverse contributions and may negatively affect the quality and impact of research.

They also contribute to an unhealthy research culture and an unaffordable publication system.

1. DIVERSE CONTRIBUTIONS

Recognise the diversity of contributions to, and careers in, research, in accordance with the needs and the nature of the research

Purpose: broaden the recognition of the diverse practices and activities as well as careers in research, while considering the specific nature of research disciplines and other research endeavours

- Recognition of the broad diversity of contributions to quality research, including diverse outputs, practices and activities
- Recognition and valorisation of diverse roles and careers that support research
- Allowing the organisations to broaden the spectrum of what they value in research



2. QUALITATIVE EVALUATION

Base research assessment primarily on qualitative evaluation for which peer-review is central, supported by responsible use of quantitative indicators

Purpose: enable the move towards assessment criteria that focus primarily on quality while recognising that responsible use of quantitative indicators can support this where this is meaningful, which is context dependent

- Peer-review is the most robust method known for the assessment of quality, recalling the fundamental principles for rigorous and transparent peer review and recognising regular improvement of peerreview
- Revised or potentially new, criteria, tools and processes that are appropriate for the assessment of quality could be explored alongside peer review
- Moving towards assessment practices that rely more heavily on qualitative methods might require additional efforts from researchers



3. JOURNAL/PUBLICATION-BASED METRICS

Abandon the inappropriate uses in research assessment of journal- and publication-based metrics

Purpose: reduce the dominance of a narrow set of quantitative journal- and publication-based metrics

- Abandon inappropriate uses: i) relying purely on metrics to assess quality; ii) assessing outputs based on metrics relating to publication venue, format or language, rather than on merit; iii) relying otherwise on quantities that do not properly capture quality and/or impact.
- In particular: move away from journal impact factor (JIF), article influence score (AIS) and h-index as proxies of quality and impact



4. INTERNATIONAL RANKINGS

Avoid the use of rankings of research organisations in research assessment


Purpose: help avoid that the criteria used by international rankings which are not trickle down to research assessment; help the research community and research organisations regain autonomy rather than having to abide by criteria set by external commercial companies which could include control over criteria used in 'fair and responsible' rankings

- Criteria should not trickle down to the evaluation of individual researchers, research teams and research units
- Public communication can contribute to reinforcing the perception that research quality conflates with ranking positions



SUPPORTING COMMITMENTS (5.-7.)

Three commitments to pilot and enable the move towards new criteria, tools and processes for research assessment





- 6. Review and develop research assessment criteria, tools and processes.
- 7. Raise awareness of research assessment reform and provide transparent communication, guidance, and training on assessment criteria and processes as well as their use.



SUPPORTING COMMITMENTS (8.-10.)

Three commitments to facilitate mutual learning, communicate progress and ensure that new approaches are evidence-informed

8. Exchange practices and experiences to enable mutual learning within and beyond the Coalition.



- 9. Communicate progress made on adherence to the Principles and implementation of the Commitments.
- 10. Evaluate practices, criteria and tools based on solid evidence and the state-of-the-art in research on research, and make data openly available for evidence gathering and research.



TIMEFRAME

Agreement includes touch-base points in years 1 and 5 after signature to communicate progress, based on **self-assessment**

- By year I signatories share how their organisation has started the process of reviewing or developing criteria, tools and processess.
- By year 5 signatories have regularly demonstrated progress towards reviewing, developing and evaluating criteria, tools and processes that fulfil the core commitments.





WHO CAN SIGN THE AGREEMENT?



The Agreement is open for signature to organisations from across the world:

- Universities, and their associations;
- Research centres, research infrastructures, and their associations;
- Academies, learned societies, and their associations, and associations of researchers;
- Public or private research funding organisations and their associations;
- National/regional authorities or agencies that implement some form of research assessment and their associations;
- Other relevant non-for-profit organisations involved with research assessment, and associations.

Organisations without legal personality can also sign the Agreement and join the Coalition.





ENDORSE PUBLICLY

Publicly signal the need and your willingness to reform the current ways of research assessment

ACHIEVE CHANGE

Realise change in your organisation by implementing the 10 CoARA commitments through an action plan developed within your organisation





- Signing the agreement is an opportunity to publicly signal the willingness of organisations to reform research assessment.
- Signatories keep full control on their steps to implement the Agreement and develop their own path for implementation of the Agreement.






COARA GOVERNING BODIES

- Coara Secretariat ensures smooth operation of Coara, nurtures communities around Coara, coordinates the Coara Boost project.






CoARA membership


COARA MEMBERSHIP BY COUNTRY






